Mrs Miller: Exactly! I look younger with freshly dyed hair, but I don't want to deal with the regrowth anymore. After a few weeks, it's obvious that brown is no longer my natural colour. It seems such a nuisance to cover up my white hair. It's just natural at my age.

Hairdresser: I just want you to know that the tint will start to fade after you have washed your

hair a few times. To keep the colour fresh, I would suggest adding some lowlights in the same shade of hazel, but with a colour, not a tint. These lowlights won't fade as fast. We do not have to do them now; you could also come back next

week.

Mrs Miller: Let's do the lowlights next week, on the day of my birthday. Then my hair will look

great for the party!

Hairdresser: Fine. I'll start on the blonde rinse and the oxidative tint now. In the meantime, you

could also have a look at the magazines I put on your desk. If you want, you can choose a hairstyle for your party. Then we'll do the lowlights next week, and I'll

style you for your party.

Hairdresser: Yes, we're quite busy at the moment, but that's as it should be. What can I do for

Nina: I want my hair completely straight! I'm tired of having to use a straightening iron

every day. I want a permanent solution. You offer chemical treatments for that,

don't you?

Hairdresser: Of course we do. What about your hair length? Do you want to keep it or would

you like to go shorter?

Nina: I would like to have it shorter. You can cut off up to twenty centimetres.

Hairdresser: Okay! We'll start with the haircut and then I'll apply the straightening treatment.

Awards?

Gina: I've participated in the awards since the first show in 2007. I was nominated a few

times, and I won my first award in 2011. I won the category "Damen Süd". This feeling – standing on stage and accepting the award – it was all so exciting. I knew

then that I would come back.

Gina:

When I was preparing for the next Hairdressing Awards, everything was going really well. I worked on the concept for about four, five months as usual, and I was very satisfied with it. I had very clear ideas, and they translated well onto the models and the pictures. I received a few nominations again, and then it was as if I was on stage all the time: I won "Damen Süd", "Farbe" and "Publikum". It was the best day you can imagine in a hairdresser's career.

Then there was the finale and Arabella Kiesbauer announced the winner. "And the hairdresser of the year is ... Gina Aichbauer!" I was completely surprised, so happy, and so, so proud. It was an indescribable feeling that I will never forget!
